



CITY COUNCIL WORK SESSION MINUTES APRIL 9, 2020

The scheduled Work Session of the Ontario City Council was called to order by Mayor Riley Hill at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, April 9, 2020, in the Council Chambers of City Hall. Council members present were Riley Hill, Marty Justus, Michael Braden, Norm Crume, Dan Capron, and Freddy Rodriguez. Ramon Palomo participated by phone.

Members of staff present were Adam Brown, Tori Barnett, Terry Leighton, Peter Hall, and Steven Romero. Participating by phone were Kari Ott, Dan Cummings, Larry Sullivan, and Betsy Roberts.

The meeting was recorded, and copies are available at City Hall.

Mayor Hill led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance.

AGENDA

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Dustin: I'm here on behalf of The Nichols Accounting Group and they would like me to deliver a statement today. While, with the hopes of Nichols Accounting, who strongly wanted to be present tonight, the current package requires their attention and asked me to deliver their statement in their stead. The Nichols Accounting Group remains committed to helping find a solution for a more permanent placement for the homeless shelter in Ontario. That being said, there are rumors circulating that an extension of time allowed for the shelter to remain operational will soon be requested. The Nichols Group objects to an extension being granted. This program was granted with a temporary solution to assist the homeless through the winter months. With winter officially closing and warmer and nights now here, the need for the temporary facility has ended. Further, given the current pandemic, it is our understanding that Origins Faith Community has understandably found it necessary to close access to its support programs. The access to meals, restrooms, and showers is no longer present. Any circumstances elevate my client's concerns for the health and safety of their employees and clients and are worried that further interaction will blemish their business. In closing, it should be mentioned the Nichols Accounting Group has been a mainstay business of Ontario for 45 years; they've worked hard to support the community in many ways; employs upwards of 50 people; and contributes to numerous other endeavors to better the community. While they feel the homeless do need help, they do not feel an extension of this program will accomplish what it's intended to do without causing harm to others, including their own business. Before this Council acts if such a request is made, we would urge you, that if received, it not be approved until a review meeting has taken place with the concerned neighbors of this project. Thank you.

PRESENTATIONSShelter Pilot Project

Adam Brown, City Manager, informed the Council he had been approached by Barb Higinbotham about wanting to extend the winter shelter project. They had just gotten people in the shelter last week, the first part of April, and they had secured funding through the end of May, if the Council would allow them to remain there. Otherwise, the agreement with them was that it would end on April 30th. This item was being presented for discussion, not for action.

Councilor Justus stated they had heard that there may no longer be restroom facilities and no access to a kitchen, so what was being done to ensure the people had food?

Mr. Brown stated there were restrooms at the shelters, and two hand-washing stations, located at the shelters. He was not aware of the food issue.

Councilor Rodriguez stated it was his understanding that sack lunches were available from the church.

Mr. Brown stated the day shelter was no longer open for coming in to sit down and socialize, due to Covid-19, but sack lunches were available. The shower and laundry facilities were closed.

Mayor Hill stated the conversations in the community were that it was for winter shelter, and would be temporary, and winter was over. What arrangements had been made for this to be more permanent? He didn't want to sacrifice the neighbors who were opposed to this location. The shelters didn't need any power during the summer. They could be located on the property next to the Community Development Center or across the alley from City Hall, for that month. Then they could keep their word to the people when they were told it would only be winter shelter through April.

Heather Echeveste, Housing Programs Manager, Community in Action, stated: *I have been trying to talk and I couldn't. I could hear everything that you said, but I was unable to respond. I just wanted to give an update on the shelter right now. So far, we have sheltered 17. In seven days that it's been actually occupied, we have been able to move two households into permanent housing and we are looking to house another one either tomorrow or Monday. We have been supplying water, so there are three porta-potties on site, one of them is handicapped accessible. There are two hand-washing stations, and the porta-potties and the hand-washing stations are serviced weekly. We have been providing extra food so they do go and get the meal from the meal site and then we have been providing extra food so that they can make, there's a microwave there that they have access to so that they can heat up food or we provided snacks that they have overnight or in the morning until they can go and get their warm meal from, or their bag lunch, at this point from the day shelter. So far, we have had very few issues. One issue was that someone was jumping over the back fence, so it looks like they were walking up the rock or the sand pile there that's close to the fence and then were able to jump over, but when those individuals were asked to leave, they gave no confrontation and they left willfully. Were there other questions? I was trying to listen and unmute at the same time.*

Mayor Hill asked if there was permanent, onsite management at the shelter location?

Ms. Echeveste: *We have, yes, we have Origins or New Hope Shelter has full-time, overnight coverage, and then they also provide, their oversight provides a few hours a day, and then we have volunteers that have stepped up and stepped in to provide oversight as needed when paid staff is unable to be there.*

Mayor Hill stated she mentioned in her statement "permanent housing". It was supposed to be just winter.

Ms. Echeveste: *We have, what I was trying to say, and I apologize, is that we have placed 15 people into the shelters since it opened seven days ago, and since then, we have found permanent housing for two of those families. And we will be placing others, as one more family into permanent housing either tomorrow or Monday.*

Mayor Hill asked how they were dealing with social distancing?

Ms. Echeveste: *When individuals or families enter into the shelter, we go over, we have a checklist that we go over with them and it asked very, very specific questions of whether or not they have any symptoms, and it gives them a list of symptoms and they can check yes or no, and then we also have them, we go over a very detailed list of recommendations from not only how our local health department, but also from the World Health Organization and all of the other information that we've received, so we go over that very specifically. We have them sign an agreement that they have received the information and that they understand it, and then we give them a copy of that.*

Mayor Hill stated things had changed since this was first presented to the Council, as they were now dealing with the Corona virus situation. The City Manager indicated they would be asking for an extension. Had they talked to all the surrounding residents and businesses about that?

Ms. Echeveste: *I have not personally. I couldn't speak for, to be honest, there had been so many conversations around it, I have not talked to anyone directly. I cannot speak for Barb or James. I know that James was in contact with Nichols, and he did give us an update on their conversation and questions that they had, but no, it hasn't, I think that this is step one and we didn't want to give out any information that wasn't accurate. We wanted to present it first.*

Mary Butler, Ontario: *I live across the street from everything, from the shelter. The onsite manager that they're supposed to have, people are out, they say there is supposed to be an onsite manager, but at 2 o'clock in the morning when people are like congregating out in the road and I've got people walking through my driveway, they're bugging the neighbors, there's not really any, it doesn't seem like there's any rules for the place that's supposed to be a shelter not a house where you come and go. It seems like there needs to be a little bit more rules. I'm not for it being extended, at all. I've bought cameras for my house, which I shouldn't have had to, my kids have asked me to move. Yesterday there was a trailer parked in the lot in front of the tiny houses with recliners and dirt, I mean, I took a picture of it. It's just ridiculous. There's supposed to be an onsite manager. How much more garbage is going to end up accumulating. Those are mainly my concerns, if she could address them. I don't want it extended, at all. That's my main thing.*

Councilor Capron stated they were told a date, and then to see how it went. Not only with the residents there, but with the whole program. Promises were made. The program sort of fell apart getting it going, and that was not the fault of the surrounding residents. He would like to hear from more residents before deciding what action to take.

Councilor Rodriguez stated they knew how the residents in the area felt. Since the beginning it had been stated it was temporary. He stood with the neighbors.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

CRUME moved, CAPRON seconded, **TO AMEND THE AGENDA TO ADD THE AMERESCO PRESENTATION.** Roll call vote: Rodriguez-yes; Justus-yes; Palomo-yes; Capron-yes; Braden-yes; Crume-yes; Hill-yes. Motion carried 7/0/0.

Ameresco Presentation

Adam Brown, City Manager, stated this was just a preview to the next step. All the time that had been invested by Ameresco this point was gratis, no financial obligation to the city. They had been to Ontario twice, visited the city facilities multiple times, and were now confident they had an energy savings project for the city that would save the city long-term.

Rob Haneline, Ameresco: *Thank you for moving us in. We are very excited to be here. Lonn Inman is our leading energy engineer on the project and he's on the line as well. We're here tonight to discuss and share with you our energy audit proposal. We were awarded this December 5th and were on site January 23rd and February 5th. We've walked through all of the facilities, all the city facilities, and have evaluated all of their assets that consume electricity, gas, and water. We have come up with a list that has 16 energy conservation measures that we feel will save electricity, gas, and water in the area of 10-30% of energy savings. I can't see if you have the fee proposal in front of you or not, so...*

Mr. Brown stated they did not, so it was just an oral report.

Mr. Haneline: *In the interest of time, I can go through the detailed process and/or I can hand it over to Lonn, our energy engineer, and he can walk through some of the energy conservation measures that we have identified in collaboration with Jacobs, thank you for your support by the way, and the measures that we would like to propose our fee to study and complete the development and return with a, if you approve it, we would return with a energy services proposal that is a development of deliverable projects, guaranteed project costs, guaranteed energy savings, and performance. Can you tell me which version you want – the detailed version or you want to drop right into project line items?*

Mr. Brown asked for an idea on some things that would be in the projects.

Mr. Inman: *In the interest of time, I will try to keep it short and not get too detailed. Essentially, we've looked at utility bills, we've interviewed occupants and managers of the facilities throughout Ontario and we have identified four pages of potential energy conservation. (Couldn't hear him speaking) city wide projects.*

Mr. Brown informed Lon that he wasn't being heard.

Mayor Hill suggested that he hit some of the high points and provided it all in writing because no one could hear him speaking.

Mr. Haneline: *I can take it from here, Lonn. We went through all of the city facilities, City Hall, Fire Station, Public Works, Parks, we went through the Water and Wastewater Treatment Plants, we gathered a bunch of information on the lift stations, and decorative street lighting that was desired to be installed in the downtown area. We are going to evaluate the streetlights, the way they consume electricity and determine whether or not it made sense to try and take ownership of those streetlights. We know the city consumes a little over \$525K a year of just electricity, and so we broke it into a couple of different buckets of strategies so citywide we'll look at water conservation measures. Those measures would be in the facilities, such as aerators, toilets, urinals, we're also look at, we'd like to look at the irrigation management system at the parks, lighting conservation measure, interior and exterior. Do you have LED lights, are they first generation? There are some safety factors with that we'll evaluate. We'd like to evaluate the exterior lighting as well. At the Wastewater Treatment Plant, we....*

Mayor Hill stated he was going to summarize: they were going to offer some type of contract that stated they were going to save the city "x" amount of money, or the city owed nothing. Was that the essence of this deal?

Mr. Haneline: *Generally, yes, that's the case. What we're looking for right now is to perform what's called an investment grade audit where we would do a deep dive into your facilities. As Adam had said, the work we've done until now identifying these measures has been pro bono. The next phase has a fee attached to it, and at the end of that we'd come back to you with guaranteed maximum project costs and guaranteed savings.*

Mayor Hill asked them to explain that portion of the contract. If the city didn't save more money than the audit, the city would be reimbursed. Correct?

Mr. Haneline: *If we cannot develop a project that meets your financial criteria, then the number of years to pay back, then you don't pay anything for the audit. If we do come up with a project that meets your financial criteria, the audit fee then gets rolled into the actual construction costs to do the energy project.*

Mayor Hill asked how much the audit would cost.

Mr. Brown stated their fee proposal was \$35K for the investment grade audit. If the city went with the project, which they had a high confidence they would have one, that cost would be rolled into the return savings. If the city decided not to do a project, that's where the city would owe them the \$35K.

Mr. Inman: *If we cannot find a project that meets your financial criteria, then the audit fee is waived. I can tell you it's not very likely that we're not going to find a project that meets your financial criteria.*

Mayor Hill verified what was being stated. Ameresco would cover the project, that was going to cost "x" dollars, they'd add their \$35K to that, and then telling the city they'd save that money, the construction costs plus the audit fee, if the city followed the guidelines presented. It would end up costing nothing.

(Cannot hear the answer)

Mr. Brown stated Ameresco would pursue all the state incentive money, even grants from Idaho Power, for all the equipment, lighting, whatever, on behalf of the city. In answer to the Mayor's overall questions, it was yes.

Mayor Hill asked if any of the projects would be highly technical and require servicing by people that were not in the area?

Mr. Brown stated they used local firms.

Dispensary Updates

Adam Brown, City Manager, stated the Council gave him authority to enforce the business license on the dispensaries. He had inspected them five times each, as well as had done quite a bit of just driving around the community. Grocery stores and a lot of other stores with high-traffic, and this community had stepped up and taken measures to protect their employees and the public. He had not found, or observed, any violations. OPD had also gone by the dispensaries and had arrived at the same conclusion. He had a conference call with all the dispensaries last Tuesday and it had been good to connect with all of them, and to hear of the measures they had taken to protect their employees and public. All three had people outside of their doors that were enforcing the social distancing requirement. He wanted to present an unbiased report, but on the other side, their traffic was mostly from Idaho. If the city were to close the dispensaries, that would significantly reduce traffic in Ontario. The measures taken were good. They started earlier than most of the grocery stores. These facilities were complying with what the Governor had asked, but the fact was it was a lot of trips into Ontario that wouldn't occur that wouldn't be there otherwise.

Shawn McKay, Burnt River Farms: *This was something we've all talked about quite a bit. If the conversation goes back to you guys wanting to close us down then yeah, I'm going to have some things I want to say, but if we're going to move forward with the decisions that the Council has made and recognizing the effort that we're doing, then I don't have anything to say.*

Stephan Crow, Ontario: *Thank you Mayor. My biggest thing is I completely agree to the cannabis being in Ontario. I think it's great that it's here. My beef right now is about the social behavior. We've been closed down now for almost 17 days in my Boise business and in my Ontario business, and I did it because it was the right thing to do. If we want to curb this piece of the Corona virus right now, we need to stop social behavior and (unintelligible) Ontario needs to shut down for 14 days (unintelligible) and I do completely support cannabis and the money they bring to the city. Thank you.*

Councilor Rodriguez believed everyone was doing their best to adhere to state guidelines. Everyone was aware that he used for medical reasons but did not have a medical card for it. He had a compromised immune system, so it was important to not expose himself to locations that serviced a large portion of customers from other areas, such as Boise, Ada County, etc. There was an option to utilize curbside service; however, he was told he would need to remove his mask. He told them he did not feel comfortable touching his face or his mask after a trip to a dangerous location. The response he received was "too bad". He was told he was refusing service, refusing to adhere to the laws that were placed over the marijuana industry by the OLCC. He found that marijuana could not be sold to anyone who could not have their entire face verified, with an ID. That would occur three times per transaction: check in, the tender, then the purchase. He believed some locations had one person handling all the steps.

Mr. McKay: *We're only required to see an ID before we make the transaction.*

Councilor Rodriguez stated he was told by another individual that there were three checkpoints. At the location he was at, that was what occurred. The problem was that even the CDC said not to touch your face when applying a mask. That was a conflict. That issue was totally apart from the fact that they were bringing in people from places that had over 400 cases of the virus. The Council needed to look out for Ontario. It wasn't just about money, but they also needed to look at community. Stop them from coming in.

Councilor Crume stated speaking about the people coming from other areas was his issue. Malheur County, as of that day, had two known Covid cases. There were 30,725 people in Malheur County from the 2018 stats.

Councilor Rodriguez stated the only person without a mask was talking right now.

Councilor Crume continued with Malheur County had one case for every 15,362 people, known cases. Washington County had one case for every 10,161 people. That was 1.5x more cases than Malheur County, but no one was talking about Washington County being a problem. Another way to see it was they had 151% more cases than Malheur

County. Payette County, which was where many of the Ontario city employees lived, and employees throughout Ontario chose to live, had six cases, 23, 551 people. One case for every 3, 925 people, or 3.91x as many cases as Malheur County, or 391% more, just across the river in Payette County. Gem County, many came here to shop, to get service work done, to wherever, and there were 17,364 people with 8 cases. One case for every 2,170 people, 7.79x more than Malheur County, or 707% more. Canyon County, which most complaints were about, had 114 cases, 223,499 people, 1 case per 1,960 people, 7.8x more than Malheur County, or 783%. The question was how to keep the people out. Forget just the marijuana purchasing. Ontario was the retail hub of this area, and being geographically located along I-84, how could that possibly be changed. Many believed that Malheur County hadn't tested enough and there were more cases than currently known. The two of the known – one worked at a gas station, so did that mean they needed to close all the gas stations? The other was an employee of a construction company. No one knew where either case originated. There were probably more cases than just the two. Maybe it was the same as Payette. He agreed marijuana purchases wouldn't be here if not for the dispensaries, but customers came to shop in Ontario for all the other businesses offered. Were they going to blockade the Snake River Bridge and not allow employees into town, or blockade the freeway, to isolate Ontario? That was the only way to stop this. Talking about shutting down one particular business; he was opposed to the idea. They all had to deal with the public. Something no one brought up was that it was the pot shops getting the target because people were standing outside the building. From a distance it might appear people were standing too close. Truck stops were a petri dish, but no one even considered shutting those businesses down. Dispensaries were doing everything the state mandated, and probably even more.

Councilor Justus stated his issue wasn't about pot. He agreed with Councilor Crume. If they wanted to eradicate the virus, then take the steps to eradicate it. You don't have to go inside a gas station to get gas – pay at the pump. Make all grocery stores curbside service only. If the intent is to eradicate the virus, then do it, but if the intent was to single out one business that had the right to be open, per the Governor, then why was this even being discussed? They needed to treat all businesses the same or they were setting themselves up for a lawsuit. He did not think that was something defensible by the city. Dispensaries were doing all they were asked to do.

Mayor Hill stated he had not issue with the dispensaries being open. He viewed it as a health issue. He received multiple calls from both sides of the spectrum. There were a lot of known cases. The Governor of Idaho tightened things up. Now he could not let more than one subcontractor on the job site at one time. He did believe the city would be sued if they force closed the dispensaries. Nobody wanted a lawsuit. His main concern was the safety of the Ontario residents. He himself was compromised and the people on his street, it was like death row. Everyone on his street was compromised. It wasn't about shutting them down, or revenue for the city, it was about safety of the people of Ontario.

Councilor Braden stated today Norm, Marty, and Freddy were his neighbors, and tomorrow they still would be. He cared about them through this crisis, as much as before and after it. He didn't want to tell any business to shut down. Each business should look at themselves and evaluate what they were doing to the community and then make their own decision. What citizens could do was protect what was theirs by staying home, by protecting themselves, and their families, keeping themselves from being exposed to the truck stops and places at risk. Be kind even in a crisis.

Cats and Covid-19/Coronavirus

Mayor Hill stated in New York, a tiger caught the virus and passed it on to some other cats; however, no one has proven that cats can pass it to humans, but humans could pass it to cats. His research stated the virus could linger on the fur of a cat and be transmitted. His advice to the community was to keep cats indoors so they couldn't mix with other cats. He also suggested speaking with the Feral Cat Program about handling this issue.

Chief Romero had contacted his brother, who was the Medical Director at Michigan State University Medical Center, asking about this issue and wanted to share with the Council his brother's response to the question of "Do Feral Cats Pose a Threat to Humans"? The response was: *Feral cats pose very, very little risk. The poor animals in New York are being exposed to us and a reverse zoonosis is occurring where humans are infecting them. The feral cats are actually beneficial as they keep rodent populations in check. The virus is linked more specifically to bats.*

Contingency Plan for Homeless Population

Mayor Hill stated he had been contacted by Ken Hart, Saint Alphonsus Medical Center, about a contingency plan for the homeless population that might contract the Corona virus. If the hospital took someone in diagnosed with the virus, unless that person was sick and/or needed to be hospitalized, they were turned out. The resulted in homeless individuals positive for the virus walking around in the community. It had been stated earlier that the homeless population were congregating and not maintaining social distancing. That was a good way for the virus to spread. He wanted to see if the community could develop a contingency plan for that case that might occur. Since that was brought up to him, Saint Alphonsus had tried to create a plan in Boise and Nampa and were going to hold a community meeting on Monday. The virus could spread rapidly if the wrong contact took place. He was always open to suggestions on how to deal with this issue.

Mr. Brown stated Mayor Hill was a member of the city's Emergency Operations Center as the Chief Elected Officer of the city, so that issue was already being discussed with that group. A few places were being looked at for temporary housing, and the possibility of supplying meals.

CORRESPONDENCE, COMMENTS, AND EX-OFFICIO REPORTS

- Councilor Crume stated he was aware that a letter had been sent out directly to the dispensaries.

Mr. Brown stated that was correct, but it was currently being revised.

Councilor Crume stated his concern was segregating one particular business. He felt it was wrong, if not illegal. The Governor stated what had to occur to stay open, but it appeared the city was telling businesses to tell their patrons what to do. That was going to offend customers, and he actually thought it offensive.

Mr. Brown asked for Council direction. The revised letter read that in the interest of public health during this pandemic, we hope that you will make as few stops as possible after your shopping experience here. He asked the ordinance officers to ask all businesses to post the statement. OLCC was contacted and he was told it was against the law for people from Idaho to take marijuana over the Oregon/Idaho border. However, that was exactly what was occurring. He revised the original letter and was now in line with the County Health Department, the Governor's orders, the CDC, and the Oregon Health Authority. OLCC okayed the amended language.

Councilor Capron stated with the new wording, if it was voluntary, if someone wanted to post it, fine, but not to make it mandatory.

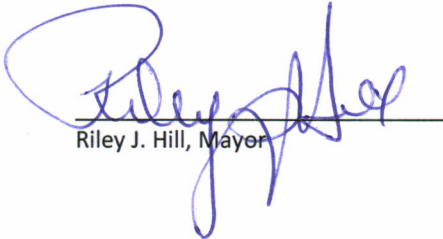
Councilor Crume agreed. Voluntary, not mandatory.
